
Success Is Greater Than The Classroom: Student Robert Kinnard Works Towards His Respiratory Care Certification

recently motivated students at The Academy with his appearance as a special guest lecturer. From humble beginnings in the Cobb Creek section of Philadelphia, Councilman Oh shared how he was inspired to start his own law practice and, ultimately, serve the people of Philadelphia. "It was tough, but my father instilled in me the values of perseverance and dedication," said Councilman Oh.

The first Asian-American elected to office in Philadelphia, Councilman Oh serves on many committees including the **Disabled and Handicapped Committee**. A friend of The Academy and job seekers with disabilities, Oh has employed Academy interns in his law-practice at **Zarwin & Baum**. "A lot of what a job is to help success happen," says Oh. "You need to make yourself known and never give up."

Oh ran for City Council three times before ultimately being elected. "He told us, through his personal story, to keep trying and to make yourself known. Councilman Oh didn't let his losses discourage him and we found this inspiring," said **Academy jobseeker and committee-woman, Jill Crowding.**

"Part of what makes a good worker is someone that has perspective," said Councilman Oh. Through invaluable life experiences and skills that they have learned at The Academy, students are ready for competitive employment.

"The Academy has taught me a lot about myself and helped me to gain perspective," said Academy job-seeker,
